Guest Speakers

Professor Peter Donnelly, Interim Postgraduate Dean, Secondary Care, Wales Deanery

Professor Peter Donnelly qualified from University College Dublin in 1983. He trained in psychiatry in Wales and Sheffield, before taking up a Consultant post in Swansea in 1993.

Peter was Postgraduate Organiser and Royal College Tutor from 1999 to 2004 and was then appointed Director of Postgraduate Medical Education in Swansea NHS Trust.

Peter was Deputy Postgraduate Dean, working alongside Professor Derek Gallen, Postgraduate Dean, contributing to the ongoing development of the Wales Deanery. From 1 January 2017, Peter commenced the role of Interim Postgraduate Dean. Peter leads on a number of educational initiatives for trainees across Wales, including the introduction of the Education Contract and the Welsh Clinical Leadership Training Fellows Scheme.

Peter's research interests include evaluation of education initiatives, leadership competencies for doctors and other health care staff and technology enhanced learning.

Dr Helen Baker, Associate Director, Secondary Care, Wales Deanery

Dr Helen Baker graduated in 1997 with 1st Class Honours in Management Science. After completing management training in the retail sector she commenced a PhD in Mathematical Modelling of Calcium Signals in the department of Medical Biochemistry, University of Wales College of Medicine (UWCM).

In 2003 she joined the Wales Deanery as the MMC Project Manager responsible for managing the introduction of the 2-year Foundation Programme as part of the Modernising Medical Careers (MMC) reform.

She was instrumental in the creation and development of the Specialty Training Office within the Wales Deanery and accepted the position of managing this team in 2009. Since then the remit has expanded to take on a lead role for a number of initiatives for all trainees across secondary care including the development of Specialty Training Schools, the Wales Clinical Academic Track Programme, the Training Reconfiguration Programme and more recently the introduction of Education Contracts.



Mr Patrick Mitchell, Regional Director, Health Education England (South)

Patrick was appointed HEE Director for the South of England in April 2016 after being HEE Director of National Programmes. In that role, Patrick's responsibilities included managing national systems for the selection and recruitment of doctors in the training, E-Learning for Healthcare and the Better Training, Better Care programme on the delivery of medical education and training.



Previously, Patrick was Chief Operating Office/Deputy Chief Executive at St George's Healthcare NHS Trust in south London and working as Director for Operations at the Royal Brompton and Harefield NHS Trust.

Prior to that Patrick was a management consultant with PriceWaterhouseCoopers health practice in San Francisco. He started his career as a graduate management trainee in the Trent region and moved to London in 1992 and has worked at a number of London teaching centres including Guy's and St Thomas'.

Patrick's prior Board experience, managing large acute hospitals and integrated systems provides him with the knowledge and understanding to know that reskilling the existing workforce is pivotal in any solution for sustainable quality services and providing the experience patients rightly expect.

Professor Sheona MacLeod, Postgraduate Dean, Health Education England, East Midlands, Chair of HEE Deans and Chair Elect of COPMeD

Professor Sheona Macleod, is the Postgraduate Dean in the East Midlands, Chair of Health Education England's Deans and Recruitment Advisor on Quality and Standards in HEE. She is an Honorary Professor of the University of Nottingham and the University of Leicester and Deputy Chair of COPMED.



Sheona graduated in Glasgow, and trained in Paisley, before moving to Derbyshire, where she was a GP for 26 years. She also worked as the Occupational Health Advisor in a number of regional industries, as Clinical Assistant in the local community hospital, and as a Medical Officer for HMP service.

She has been involved in healthcare education since moving to Derbyshire. She has been a GP tutor, Trust Appraisal Lead, Training Programme Director and Associate Postgraduate Dean. She became the GP Dean in East Midlands in 2009, and was appointed as Postgraduate Dean in September 2012.

Ms Fiona Dalton, Chief Executive, University Hospital Southampton NHS Foundation Trust

Fiona was appointed as Chief Executive in 2013. Prior to rejoining the Trust she held the combined position of deputy chief executive and chief operating officer at Great Ormond Street Hospital for Children.



Fiona joined the NHS management training scheme after graduating from Oxford University with a degree in human sciences in 1994 and began her career in hospital management at Oxford Radcliffe Hospitals NHS Trust. She then spent four years at UHS as director of strategy and business development before moving to GOSH.

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
